This article is the result of work with two recent graduates (Gabrielle Perkins, class of 2020, and Cheyenne Mitchell, class of 2019) that studies electron mobility kinetics in dye-sensitized solar cells which are a low-cost alternative to traditional silicon solar cells. For this paper the authors constructed working solar cells using TiO₂ (the white pigment found in white-out) and a dye molecule found in raspberry juice. They measured the photocurrent from these devices while switching the light source on and off. From the

results of fitting the data, they were able to support an electron hopping model where electrons in the devices need to move through a dispersive energetic landscape and electrons can become trapped in the device for seconds after the light is turned off.

This paper presents the results of a content analysis of more than 2,000 Facebook posts from candidates in Guatemala's 2019 presidential election. The data show that presidential campaigns use Facebook to mention issues of concern to voters, but offer few policy proposals. They also rarely attack other candidates or tout their own qualifications for the presidency. The data also reveal systematic differences in campaign messaging between frontrunner and long-shot candidates.
