



# FIRE STRIKES WARDO

The night was cold and the chilling wind made it 22 degrees on Wednesday, December 8, 1976. The crowd increased in number as the time lagged on and the word was spread across campus. They came to keep a silent vigil with everyone else until the last blaze was extinguished and to offer what understanding they could to Tom Wingate and Bobby Boyer. At 12:30 a.m. Thursday morning it was all over. The fire had been contained to the one room but the damages and losses in the room were many. The next day B.C. students helped scrub and paint the damaged rooms and halls. A fire fund was set up for Bobby and Tom and the pool room proceeds were donated to help replace their losses. Although Christmas is a time for joy, there was a note of sadness in the air that night, but most important was the closeness it brought to everyone. "This is what the real meaning of Christmas is."











The Eagles were led by Billy Pope, averaging five assists a game; Jim Mumper, averaging nine rebounds a game; and Barney Reiley, Woody Hays, Dusty Miller and Jim Mumper, all averaging double-figure scoring.


who represented the class did it with respect and dignity, while those in the background were filled with pride.
